Our meeting this month will be held on **February 12th** beginning promptly at **6:30pm in the Ed Jones Auditorium on the campus of Ellington Agricultural Center**. We will also recognize the achievement of our Master Gardeners in 2014 as we hold our annual **ACT Awards**!

The program will be presented by **Jason Adkins**, director of the **Trevecca Urban Farm** at Trevecca Nazarene University. Through photographs and descriptions, he will share about the amazing permaculture that has been created in one of Nashville's "food deserts".

In addition to his work in the garden and farmyard, Jason is also an instructor teaching environmental justice to the university's students. He is also the president and a founding member of the Tennessee Organic Growers Association and has traveled to Asia and Africa to consult on practices of sustainable agriculture with communities in poverty.

Through a degree program and with neighboring schools, young people are learning the particulars of growing all kinds of food and the big picture of how good farming sustains the poor and the planet alike.

The farm operates as a constellation of growing works (including goats, pigs, chickens, worms, tilapia, orchards, gardens, mushrooms, and composting) on the Trevecca University campus and in the surrounding neighborhood—an area that faces challenges to food access.

If you do have some rust on your tools, brush them with a wire brush before applying the oil. Also, check your pruners to make sure they are sharp.

Make certain to dress warmly and bring your gloves and hand pruners. This is a "hands-on" workshops where you will learn all you need to know about maintaining Boxwood. - Creeping Phlox, early spring series


Other booth needs include:

Red Raspberry Chocolate Bars

Ingredients:

- ▶ 2½ c all-purpose flour
- ▶ 1 c sugar
- ▶ ¾ c pecans, finely chopped

- ▶ 1 egg, beaten
- ▶ 1 c cold butter or margarine
- ▶ 1 12-oz. jar red raspberry jam
- ▶ 1⅔ c chocolate chips

Instructions:

Heat oven to 350°F. Grease 13x9x2-inch baking pan.

Stir together flour, sugar, pecans, and egg in a large bowl. Cut in butter with fork until mixture resembles coarse crumbs; set aside $1\frac{1}{2}$ c crumb mixture. Press remaining crumb mixture on bottom of prepared pan. Stir jam to soften; carefully spread over crumb mixture in pan. Sprinkle with chocolate chips. Crumble reserved crumb mixture evenly over top.

Bake 40 to 45 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool completely in pan on wire rack, then cut into bars.

Makes 36 bars.
